EAACH GENERAL MEETING MINUTES Equity Alliance for Achievement – October 24th, 2016

Maria García, Latino Outreach Specialist from Diversity, Equity and Outreach Department (DEO) facilitated the meeting and welcomed attendees. She asked them to sign-in and serve some food offered by the Edmonds School District (ESC).

Members from the EAACH Leadership Team (LT) were asked to introduce themselves and share the reasons they continue to remain active in EAACH. Introductions are listed in the order of participation:

- María García shared that she used to meet with parents before the EAACH Committee was created and her position emerged as a result of parents' advocacy efforts. With the support of the District, the EAACH Committee was created as a space to bring the community together and build partnerships and so far EAACH has done a great job of including the community.
- Bill Henning said that he has been involved with the EAACH for six years. He is grateful to be given a chance to be a "white ally" to use his privilege and with the collective experience of families and students in the district, there have been changes.
- Marisa Cortés shared that she has been in EAACH for 6-7 years and was involved even before it was created. EAACH is great group for new parents to work on goals to improve the District. For example, five years ago, the District calendar was only in English and with the support from EAACH, the District agreed to translate the calendar and include holidays from other cultures. Another example was the creation of the language line for Spanish speakers, with the goal of having language line services in other languages. Marissa concluded saying that there is a long list of successes through the efforts of EAACH.
- Jessica Cabrera said that she also has been involved with EAACH since the beginning. There are many achievements from EAACH, for example family events in schools in which families gathered and received information about college. Also, some parents attending these events created subcommittees to work with other parents in the community; as a result, they could bring their voices to the District.
- Jessica Marín shared that she has been involved with EAACH since the beginning too. There have been many achievements for students and parents, for example the listening kits that District and schools can use at different events. They can be used in 5 languages at the same time.
- Brenda Bequette said that she has been with EAACH for five years and represents Indigenous people. She mentioned that from the work of EAACH emerged the Summer Math Program and many other ideas that help support students.
- Juan Marín introduced himself as Jessica Marín's husband and shared that they have been involved together in EAACH. He mentioned that the position of the Family and Community Engagement Specialist was a result of EAACH work.
- Karena Hooks introduced herself as the Diversity, Equity and Outreach Manager. She welcomed the new members and returning members and encouraged people to continue coming to the meetings.
- Justin Irish explained that as a white male with a position in the District he had learn about the community and perceived EAACH as a partnership between the District and the community, an equitable opportunity to have the community at the table, create trust and partner with the District and impact the access of high quality education to all students.

- María shared that there are a couple more members who couldn't attend this meeting today, Zed Aschenaki and Joanna Ollivierre. Additionally, Maria shared that there are two MSW UW Social Work Interns also on the EAACH Leadership Team this year, Catalina Angel (introduced herself) and Christina Barzare (absent).

María said that there have been some changes in the District and that the goal is to collaboratively partner to ensure we have the community at the table. She also shared that soon we are going to have a product that reflects the outcomes of EAACH's work. Maria mentioned that lately there have been some challenges within EAACH group dynamics as a result of institutional changes with the goal of healing together as we have difficult conversations to build community. As liaison María is here to strengthen the connection between the District and community through this challenging process.

The attendees divided into their quadrants and were given Group Guiding Questions to work on collectively and then were going to be given the opportunity to report out to the larger group.
